



Dave's January display car is a 1958 100/6 optioned up to 3000 specifications with a 3-litre engine and disc brakes. It is

red with a cream hardtop, the colours of the successful factory rally cars of the early 1960's.

Dave fell in love with the car in March 2022 when visiting the Healey Factory showroom in Melbourne. It was still there when he was at the Healey Factory again in November.

He could not resist and decided to purchase a car that he could drive rather than restore. Fellow member Mark Thornton helped Dave get the car to Perth.

Of the 60,000 "big" Austin Healey's built, over 80% were sold in the US. So, funnily for an English sports car, most Austin Healey's were lefthand drive with many converted to righthand drive. The car was restored 25 years ago and is still in good condition. There are some things Dave wants to do to his "Healey" like quieten the exhaust and put on more period correct skinnier tyres.

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

Restoration Blog- "Little Charlie" by Jon-Jon Ramirez

andy and I are enjoying a show recommended by Bob DeJong called the "The Last Overland"

Filmed in 2019 it is a documentary of Eighty-seven-year-old adventurer Tim Slessor, as he sets out to recreate his own 1955 record-breaking drive from London to Singapore, in the same badly behaved old Land Rover.

We also have a badly behaved old Land Rover, we are currently restoring a Series 2a named "Little Charlie". While watching the documentary we couldn't help but think that Sandy's late father Gary Wright was inspired by Tim and his 1955 adventure that crossed 23 countries.







In the late 60's Gary along with his brother Simon travelled in a Land Rover Series 2a from London to Gwelo Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe), google tells me that is a 7,800 plus mile trip but I suspect during the '60s this was much longer and much more difficult. Sandy recalls her father telling stories of being held at gunpoint, passports taken off them and bribing their way along the Trans-Sahara. They also had a badly behaved Land Rover who broke down often.





Restoring our Land Rover "Little Charlie" is our own adventure, we searched for a Series 2a like Sandy's fathers and found one last July and started the process of a nut and bolt restoration.



At times it has been arduous and hard, but over the last six months we have forged new friendships, learned new skills, gained a sense of accomplishment as well as spending time together as a couple.

We are creating treasured memories and for Sandy it is more profound as it represents family history, a way of connecting and preserving memories of her father Gary whom we lost too soon.

At the start of the restoration of "Little Charlie" some people may look and think it's a waste of time and resources, monetary value aside it's the memories attached to "Little Charlie" that are copious, rewarding us an emotional and sentimental value that can't be measured by normal means.

This is more than a restoration.

Continuation of my interpretation of fashion history, 1960s

esigners used famous faces and fleeting fads to influence and inspire their clothing collections, with the result music and fashion went hand in hand. No longer were young men inspired by movie stars. The Beatles were right at the top, their revolutionary style, including longer hair, was enthusiastically adopted by young men worldwide. New style icons of the music scene Mick Jagger, and Jimmy Hendrix, were also greeted with admiration. Young men shopped in Boutiques that specialized in the clothing of their heroes. Men's fashion changed massively and quickly in swinging London, the new shape was slim jacket and pants worn with heeled boots. Bright coloured prints, tapestry, and stripes found their way onto conventional suits. Shirts, ties and cravats in satin or silk with bright paisleys or psychedelic pop art were also popular. As young men grew their hair longer and experimented with colour, print and fashion, the 60s became known as the peacock era.

Mary Quant is the woman behind the most important look of the 60s, the Miniskirt. Quant designed fashion specifically for young people, in mind-blowing, groovy colours. Selling from her boutique "Bazaar" on King's Road, her fashions were seen on the top models, Jean Shrimpton, and Twiggy, elevating it to must-have status. Jean Shrimpton famously introduced the miniskirt to Australia at the 1965 Melbourne Cup, and Twiggy the "Queen of Mod" introduce Americans to the mini.

The cool car of the youth was the Mini, after which Mary Quant named her miniskirt. Ideal city transport, small enough to zap around, easy to park but big enough to fit in every member of the Beatles. The mini was so popular it showed up in 1969s cinema classic "The Italian Job"

Everything that happened in this English city, rippled out across the western world. By the mid-1960s young people in

other countries were wearing Mod fashion and listening to British music as it invaded the globe.


Do you think that bruised our ego? Or our initiative was destroyed? We ate what was put on the table And I think life was better enjoyed.

Father of the Austin Healey



onald Healey, founder of the Donald Healey Motor Company, was an interesting person. He was born in Cornwall in 1898 (and died in 1988)

He became interested in all things mechanical at an early age, most particularly aircraft. He studied engineering and won an apprenticeship with Sopwith Aviation Company.

He volunteered in 1916 (before the end of his apprenticeship for the Royal Flying Corps) and earned his "wings" as a pilot.

He went on night bombing raids and served on anti-Zeppelin patrols and as a flying instructor. He was shot down by British anti-aircraft fire and after a further series of crashes he was invalided out of the RFC.

After the war, he returned to Cornwall, took a correspondence course in automobile engineering, and opened the first garage in 1920.

Donald found rally driving and motor racing more interesting than his garage and used the garage to prepare cars for competition. He first entered the Monte Carlo Rally in 1929 driving a Triumph 7. He won in 1931 driving a 4.5 litre Invicta and came 2nd the next year.

He worked for Riley but soon moved to the Triumph Motor Company and was made technical director and responsible for the design of all Triumph cars in the 1930's.

He was keen to begin making his own cars and his first car appeared in 1946, the Healey Elliot, a saloon with a Riley engine.

Next was a high-performance sports car, the Silverstone which appeared in 1949 and was so successful it led to an agreement with an American company Nash Motors. This gave Donald a good understanding of the American market

So far, the Healey's had all been expensive. Donald wanted to produce a comparatively inexpensive sports car with 100 mph performance and specifically aimed at the affluent post war American market.

He developed the Healey 100 using an Austin A90 2.6 litre 4 cylinder engine and various other Austin components in a Healey chassis with lovely bodywork. It was displayed at the 1952 Earls Court motor show in London. Lenard Lord, head of Austin was also desperate to break into the American market. Their Austin Atlantic had been a failure. Famously, Lord saw the Healey 100 and did a deal with Donald Healey overnight. The next day the car became the AUSTIN HEALEY 100.

The car was highly successful.

In 1956, Austin retired the old 4-cylinder engine and fitted a 2.6 litre Austin Westminster 6-cylinder engine. This was the 100/6 which was also four inches longer to fit the 6-cylinder. In 1959 the engine was upgraded to three litres and disc brakes were fitted. Named the Austin Healey 3000, this car continued until 1967.

Healey went on to develop the Austin Healey Sprite, a smaller sports car based on Austin A35 mechanicals, the so-called Frogeye. Member, Mark Atkinson's car is a splendid example. Later again, Healey developed the Jenson Healey, Member Rob Popiel has a nice one.

1939 Willys



The depression hit Willys-Overland hard, and they went into receivership and only survived thanks to the Willys 77, a rather odd, plucky, little compact which would be popular with future hot rodders. These were made in batches as permitted by the bankruptcy court. But that is a story for another time.

However, when they came out of receivership, they moved forward with new determination. The 1929 Model 39 featured Lockheed hydraulic brakes (previous models used cable brakes), a two-inch increase in wheelbase to 102 inches and an improved 134 CID four-cylinder engine with power increased from 48 to 61 hp. The Model 39 was marketed as an Overland and as a Willys-Overland rather than as a Willys.

There are two main stories with the 1939:

Amos Northrup of Murray Corporation, one of the world's greatest but least recognised automotive stylist, designed the 1939 model. According to lore, Northup inked a design for a passenger steamship and a streamlined steam locomotive in 1935, and thus became enthralled with the notion of a prow, either above the waves or behind the locomotive pilot, which some people still call a cowcatcher. In 1939, the Willys line grew an upright, forward-sloping nose adding a remarkable element of eye-shock to that lowly compact. The name given to it by Amos was the "Spirit of Motion" but it rapidly became called the "Sharknose,". Graham also a Murray client, and Northup began applying the same treatment to Graham's 1938 models. The design was eye-popping and controversial,

however didn't sell well. Willys only used the style for the 1939 and Graham was gone after 1941.

The important event is that Willys-Overland hired Roos as chief engineer in 1938, and Roos had an enviable resume. His automotive career began in 1912 working for Locomobile (then Timken Axle), Pierce Arrow, Marmon, Studebaker, and Rootes in England. He was noted as a great "engine man" and had created several notable designs. Short fused and impatient, he was a tough guy to work around, but Roos was an undeniable mover, shaker, and hard driver. The first job for Roos was to redo the anaemic Willys four and do it on a budget. The Willys four had appeared in the 1926 Whippet, which was the company's first economy car, albeit an upscale one. It displaced 134.2 ci, just like the later Go-Devil, but only made 30 hp. By the late '30s, the Willys four was making 48 hp with a few upgrades, but it had become notoriously unreliable and was well under the market's power curve.

Roos' reliability benchmark was 100 hours at full power. One of his first tasks was to strap the 48hp engine to a dyno. It lasted 22 hours at 3,400 rpm—'nuff said. Roos and his staff set to modernizing the engine, incorporating insert bearings, a fully counterbalanced crankshaft, aluminium pistons, a fully pressurized lubrication system, and a revised valvetrain. In just a few months, the new engine was ready for the dyno. It exceeded 100 hours at over 60 hp at a whopping 4,400 rpm. The new engine was dubbed Go-Devil and first appeared in the 1939 Willys cars rated at 61 hp at 3600 rpm. This is the same engine that became the heart of the mythical Jeep, and which lead to the rise of the Jeep. (But that is another story).




VAA Swap Meet Sunday 2nd April 2023


