I look forward to seeing you at our next meeting.





The car is a 1975 Chrysler CK, also known as a "Chrysler by Chrysler".

As this was an up market car like Statesman and Fairlane, the idea was to disseminate this model from the "Valiant by Chrysler".

These cars have a 4" longer wheelbase than the standard valiant sedan.

The body is different from the "B" pillars back although it used the rear doors, boot lid and rear bumper, off the valiant.

The rear window is much smaller than standard and specific to these models.

The wrap around front bumper and cast grille is another unique feature of the Chrysler by Chrysler series.

870 of this model were produced. Some of the last ones were fitted with the 318ci V8 and became known as the "SE" edition.

My Car

The car was sold new by a dealership in Mandurah

1975 CK Chrysler by Chrysler, 360ci (5.9Litre) V8 with a 727 automatic transmission, Power Steering, Power Brakes, Power Windows, Air conditioning, Fuel Pacer, Vinyl Roof and 2.77 ratio 4 pinion differential.

The front seats are "bench/buckets" as they have foldable arm rests and can seat three if folded down.

The "Fuel Pacer" was an option to promote economical driving (optimistic in a car that gets 12mpg!) by lighting an indicator on the right hand fender if you put your foot on the accelerator too much.

I bought this car in 1987 as a parts donor for another car I was doing up at the time, it was not in great condition even though it had only around 120,000K's showing.

I decided I liked it more than the other car I was fixing, so I tidied it up, put another engine in it and used it as a daily driver for a number of years.

It eventually got a yellow sticker and that put it off the road, so it went into the backyard under a tarp.

Eleven years later, I decided to do it up which took about 3 years.

I got it re-licensed in 2009 and it has been on the road since.

I have recently rebuilt the original engine and that should be going in soon.


VAA Breakfast 15 Jan 2023

TIG Welding

If you've just entered the world of welding, then there's at least one phrase you've probably already heard a few times: 'TIG welding is hard.'

Learning how to TIG weld does take a lot of practice, and the need for both hands makes it more difficult than MIG or stick. But that doesn't mean it's an impossible task that you shouldn't even think about until you've mastered everything else.

TIG welding is like any other kind of welding. You should start with the basics.

What is TIG Welding?

Tungsten Inert Gas (TIG) welding is an arc welding process in which an arc is formed between a non-consumable tungsten electrode and the workpiece to create the weld.

Filler metal is added manually, though it isn't always necessary.


An inert shielding gas is fed through the TIG torch to protect the weld from outside contaminants.

TIG welding is also known as Gas Tungsten Arc Welding (GTAW).

How Does TIG Welding Work?

You can TIG weld two different ways: with alternating current (AC) or direct current (DC). Either way, it needs a completed electric circuit running on a constant-current power source to work. All the parts of a TIG machine work together to form this circuit.

First, the TIG torch is assembled. The collet, **collet body/gas lens** and back cap all slot together to hold the tungsten in place in the centre. A gas shroud goes over the top to direct the shielding gas.



The TIG torch plugs into the welder, forming one part of the welding circuit. An arc is formed between the tungsten electrode and the workpiece.

Tungsten has a melting point of 3,422°C, so it can withstand the heat of a welding arc. That's why it is a 'non-consumable' electrode. It doesn't melt and enter the weld pool.

To add metal, an additional filler rod can be fed into the weld puddle by hand to form a proper weld.

That's half of the electric circuit.

To complete the circuit, an earth clamp is needed. If you don't have an earth clamp plugged into the machine and connected to the metal you're trying to weld, the welder won't even arc.

The ground also needs to be attached to clean, bare metal to work properly. Having a bad grounding will cause issues with the arc and it can become unstable or start to wander.

TIG welding is the only welding process that requires the use of both hands to create the weld, so it has a steeper learning curve than MIG or stick.

Continuation of my interpretation of fashion history, 1970s. By Cheryl Glew

hat an exciting decade. 70s fashion moved fast, so much so that I will only touch on a small selection. A decade of numerous trends, some huge that survived 5 minutes, others that endured the whole decade alongside or intertwined with other trends. Why was there so much going on in the 70s? The entire world was protesting. Social Justice and equality, Ethnic Pride, Gay Liberation, Grey Panthers - (Elderly and Retirees), The Black Power Revolution which escalated to the Black Liberation Army. Vietnam war protests, we talked about last month, and the Women's liberation movement picked up where the Suffragettes left off in the 1920's.

The most controversial, well known and far reaching was the women's movement starting in the late 60's, Australian women embraced and advanced Women's Liberation in the 70's. Germaine Greer's book "The Female Eunuch" published in 1970 became one of the most influential books of the Women's liberation movement. Helen Reddy's numberone hit, "I am Woman" released as a single in 1972, celebrated female empowerment and became a feminist anthem. Women were fighting for equality - equal opportunity in the workplace, childcare, equal pay, equal entry to education,

and the right to choose their work destination and duration. Women wanted it all, the choice to be independent, working women, wives', mothers, or all the above. The independence, confidence, and strength of women's rights to be equal, permeated through every aspect of life. Women wanted to be allowed to sign leases, loans, and have a cheque book without a man's signed consent. They wanted to drink in public bars. Women fought for domestic abuse to be recognised as unacceptable by law and medicine, they forced this "private matter between husband and wife" out into the public arena. Women's lib was so high profile 1975 was declared the International Year of Women.

1970 women's role in the Australian Military started to change. International year of women, 1975, saw the service chiefs establish a committee to explore opportunities to increase wom-

en's involvement in the Australian Military. This led to reforms which allowed women to deploy on active service, in support roles and pregnancy was no longer grounds for automatic termination of employment. Women started to be integrated into the Military in 1977 but it wasn't until 1979 equal pay was granted.

How did all this protest and activity translate to fashion? There were no rules! Fashion was a miss mash, a bit of everything and the idea that fashion was an expression of one's personality, rather than everyone follows the Designers, musician, or movie star trends. Clothes were mixed, whether they made sense or not. There was little difference between men and women's clothing, fashion leaned toward androgyny.

There were numerous easily recognised subculture and trends - Hippie, Ethnic/tribal, Peasant/gypsy, Punk rock, Glam rock, and Disco. We saw a revival of the Victorian era with the Prairie look, 20s art deco, 30s and 40s Hollywood glamour. The Minimalist look was a very strong theme from American designers who draw inspiration from Ancient Greece, 1920s and late 1950s, Hotpants, Halter necks, and Boob tubes also made a visit. New trends and styles came into fashion without cancelling the trend before blending with and remaining part of everyday fashion for the whole of the 70's. Elements from all cultures and trends blended and wove themselves together.

There were still a few common themes throughout the 70s, Fashion was Wide!! hair, (every girl wanted the Farrah Fawcett flick), collars, lapels, ties, flared pant, and cowl neck sweaters. Flared pants might be worn with ethnic toe sandals, desert boots, strappy heels, or 9-inch-high platforms, depending on your personal style or the occasion. Trousers and especially jeans, were tight fitting around hips and high waisted, flared out at the bottom covering the feet and shoes. This style was worn by both men and women.

Continuation of my interpretation of fashion history, 1970s

Maybe as a backlash to the Women's movement and wanting to portray masculinity, young men wore their jeans and trouser tight, showing off their manhood, often with shirts tucked in and unbuttoned revealing their chest. Gold neck chains were common for men, as was facial hair. Women's pantsuits with silky blouses were slowly becoming acceptable workwear in some workplaces. Jumpsuits were very popular for any time of day, in an enormous array of styles in every fabric from denim, soft jersey to stretchy, shiny, or metallic, (1977 Disco or nightclub). It was the first full decade in which women of all ages could be seen wearing pants for any occasion day or evening. Skirts were long again, all lengths from just below the knee to almost ankle (maxi length) usually soft and floaty but also in Denim or Corduroy. Skirts could also be A-line or straight with side splits or button front opening, wraparound skirts and dresses were also popular. Skin-tight T-Shirts, knit body shirts and mid drift tops were worn by both men and women.

In direct contrast to the wide silhouette, and every other trend was the Punk movement, joining the protest vibe from around the world they adopted obviously rebellious clothing, ripped skinny jeans, sleeveless T Shirts, often with inappropriate slogans, chains, safety pins in their clothing and bodies, rivets, leather jackets, coloured Mohawks, or shaved heads. The Punk movement was the only truly new trend to come out of the 70's, Vivienne Westwood and Malcolm McLaren's fashion was revolutionary. They were part of the music scene of London, this along with street style inspired them as they aligned themselves with the rebellion, and social protest around them. Designers' and runway collections have revisited Vivienne and Malcolm's Punk trend many times. (Most memorable Liz Hurley's, Safety Pin Dress 1994).

Denim was everywhere, in different colours and an enormous selection of garments. In 1972 Alister Norwood opened the 1st Denim boutique, Jeans West in Perth CBD, catering to both men and women supplying predominantly jeans but also dresses, skirts, shirts, jumpsuits, tailored Jackets, and bomber jackets. Striking right on target for the Denim trend, Jeans West became a mecca for every fashionable teen or young adult. Jeans West proved so popular by 1984 there were twenty-eight stores across Western Australia.

Polka Dot, Paisley and florals were popular. Polyester was the new fabric of the decade, it was versatile, held its colour, and shape well, was hard wearing and easily laundered. Corduroy was a huge trend, everyone wore some cord in their fashion rotation, be it jeans, skirts, shirts, jackets, or coats. Tartan was embraced by the Punk movement in rebellion to the Monarch. Interestingly in 1992 Vivienne was awarded an OBE by the Queen, then in 2006 a damehood by Prince Charles for her services to fashion.

Platform shoes from the 1940's made a massive revival and the 70' took them to extreme heights, they were worn by both men and women. Knee high boots were popular usually with a platform, worn with dresses, skirts, and sometimes with the trousers or jeans tucked in. (Abba style)

The Australian safari suit is a product of the 1970s, not as rugged in appearance as the military style African or Indian suits, it was fashioned down to suit the casual Australian way of dress. The Australian suit was made in fabric that did not need ironing and was sold in light coloured pastels, tan, and beige. Worn with trousers rather than shorts, the jacket was still a long line, but the belt was deleted as were some of the pockets. The suit became associated with Australian fashion because it was stylishly worn by SA Premier Don Dunstan and

Prime Minister John Howard. In the early 70s it was deemed suitable attire in the legislative Assembly, provided it was worn with a shirt and tie. This casual suit became a popular choice for salesmen

and admin staff, some men even teaming it with chunky platforms. I remember my boss rocking his safari suits in the 70s. It gained such status that Prince Charles wore a safari suit on his visit to Australia in 1983.

That my friend brings us to the end of the Gala Fashion parade. Thank you for following along as we revisited the event. Cheryl Glew
